

Large Outgrower Schemes Assessed by TechnoServe (2014)

To better understand the challenges and best practices in operating large-scale, long-standing outgrower schemes, TechnoServe assessed 25 of the largest outgrower programs in sub-Saharan Africa, each involving at least 15,000 farmers and many in operation for decades.
